


# **OUR PHILOSOPHY**


#### **Grounding Principles**


#### MESSAGE FROM OUR E.D. CONTINUED





## ECONOMIC Development

We empower businesses by connecting them to resources, education, and mentorship in collaboration with local organizations, with a focus on community needs. Through workshops, networking events, and support for block parties and larger gatherings, we foster belonging, pride, and community-based innovation, working together to sustain BIPOC businesses and honor shared spaces.





### ECON DEV HIGHLIGHTS

In 2023, we focused on strengthening our relationships with the White Center business community and continued our ongoing support.

We met with 68 merchants, 22 of which were new relationships.



We continued fire response efforts and rebuilding of businesses, approximately \$200,000 was allocated to support 40 white center businesses in storefront improvements, technical assistance, partnership opportunities, information and resources, lease agreement assistance, legal services, commercial space planning, and business coaching.

The CDA supported the White Center Block Party in August, centering White Center entrepreneurs, businesses, and performers with over 1000 participants in attendance.





### ECON DEV Continued

To advance economic and local business development, the WCCDA, Skyway Coalition, and Communidad Latina de Vashon collaborated on the creation of the 'United for a Community Led Economy' (UCLE). It expanded our Economic Development team by adding key roles to support the White Center business community. This includes folks to work on business support, workforce development, and property owner support.

With this strengthened team, the WCCDA continued to enhance the legacy, building wealth, and well-being of local businesses. We have also focused on promoting financial literacy for local youth, and begin to develop programs and processes that will shape Economic Development initiatives in the coming year.



## FAMILY DEVELOPMENT

Our department supports early learners, young adults, and families in White Center by providing navigation and access to resources, leadership opportunities, and community-building spaces. Through culturally responsive and intergenerational programming, we create opportunities for families to learn, grow, and connect with each other.







## FAM DEV HIGHLIGHTS

WCCDA's Play and Learn program continued to be a cornerstone for early learning and caregiver support. With over **300 hours** of weekly Play and Learn sessions- that's about **137 sessions** held throughout the year of ongoing opportunities to engage in educational play in safe and supportive spaces!

While in-person group gatherings were limiting our attention to everyone, our team stayed deeply connected with families of young children, offering **487 one-on-one check-ins with caregivers/ individuals, including virtually.** 



These personalized visits helped us provide tailored support, from sharing learning activities and mental health resources to delivering essential baby supplies and up-to-date COVID-related information. We closed out the year with WinterFest, a joyful community celebration filled with food, fun, and games-a reminder of the power of connection and collective care.

Families also got their hands in the soil through our Health in the Garden series at the Burien Shark Garden, where **120 participants** explored how to grow culturally relevant vegetables, learned harvesting techniques, and cooked delicious meals together. These gatherings nurtured both bodies and relationships, offering a vibrant space to reconnect with cultural roots and with one another.



And in the spirit of readiness and community support, our Back to School Celebration with KCHA, Boys & Girls Club, College Success Foundation, Amerigroup, and Krusteaz welcomed **1,000 participants**, ensuring students were equipped with essentials like backpacks, pencils, pens, notebooks, and more. The excitement and gratitude in the air were unmistakable as families gathered to kick off the school year prepared and uplifted.

Through every workshop, home visit, and community event, we are proud to walk alongside families, co-creating a stronger, healthier, and more connected White Center. 

### THE HUB Project

The Hope, Unity, and Belonging (HUB) project team spent the year building capacity to understand what the pre-design development meant. We were able to guide our architects, Sundberg Kennedy Ly-Au Young Architects (SidexSide) and general contractor Marpac Construction, WCCDA was able to incorporate notes into their design that were from the White Center residents.


The HUB team was able to identify New Markets Tax Credits lenders and investors. We fulfilled 75% of our capital campaign goal! We are excited to break ground in 2024!




